- **Q:** From a financial standpoint what are 5 key things the district is doing to be fiscally responsible to taxpayers and employees?
- **A:** Great question! I will try to condense what I feel best shows <u>accountability</u> to Lexington's taxpayers and employees.
- 1) Allocate resources according to what's best for students This must continue to be our #1 priority.
- 2) Pursue a long-term approach to fiscal stability and responsibility The district will operate strategically and plan ahead. We will make balanced financial decisions according to what is fair, feasible and sustainable in the long run. We will be good stewards of the district's resources and operate proactively instead of reactively.
- 3) **Use data to drive financial decisions** Collect data, analyze, measure, and evaluate. The district will look for the most cost effective ways to operate excellent programs. We will set goals and use benchmarks to gauge our financial position and make changes as needed.
- 4) **Communicate and listen** This is an area in which the district is committed to improve. It is crucial that we provide to our stakeholders financial information that is timely, credible, and understandable. In turn, we will listen to stakeholders. It is through a healthy exchange of ideas that we come up with the best path for the district.
- 5) Continue to operate with honesty, integrity and transparency. In doing so, we will earn the trust of our taxpayers and employees.
